The event was made possible by business and community sponsors, School District staff and student volunteers.

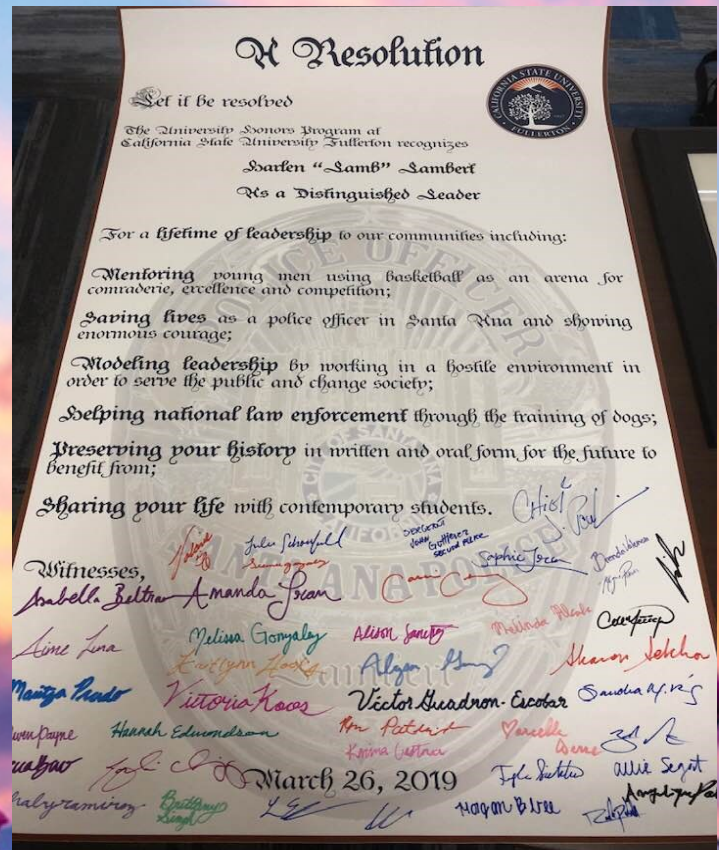
College Students Honor Local Trailblazer

Harlan "Lamb" Lambert, the first African-American police officer hired in Orange County, was honored by the University Honors Program of California State University, Fullerton with a community leadership award on March 26, 2019.

Lambert was hired to work at the Santa Ana Police Department in December 1966. During his time as a police officer, he earned a Public Safety Officer Medal of Valor, which is the highest state award given to public safety officers.

Apart from being a police officer, Lambert is also a poet. He self-published two collections of poems called "Affairs of the Heart, Volume 1" in 2016 and "Affairs of the Heart, Volume 2" in 2017. His most recent work is a memoir about his life titled "Badge of Color— Breaking the Silence."

Sharon Sekhon, adjunct professor of American studies at California State University, Fullerton and organizer of the awards ceremony seeks to authenticate Lambert's legacy to the outside world. "He continues to be a leader by sharing his story, showing up for other people and always representing what it means to be a public servant," said Sekhon.

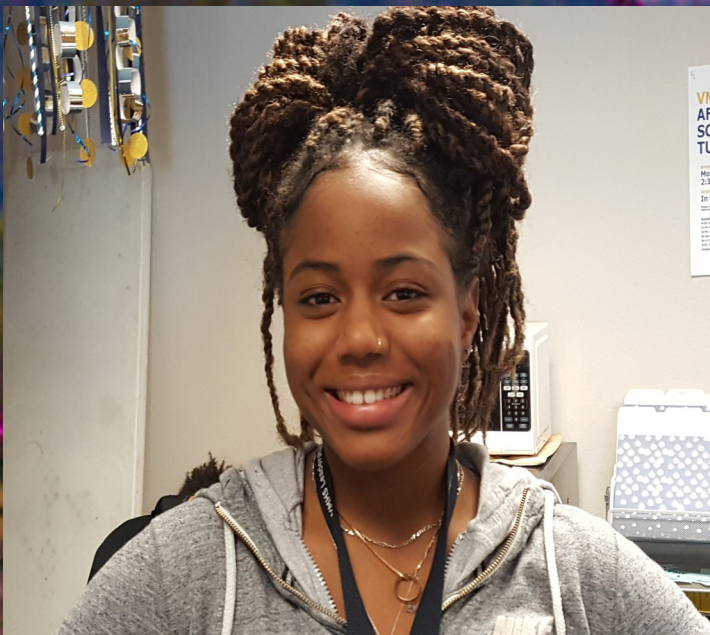

Event Teaches Students How to Manage Finances



Seniors from Summit High School in Fontana, CA learned just how challenging it can be to make financial decisions as an adult, courtesy of an interactive financial education simulation held on campus.

The April 30 "Bite of Reality" event was hosted by Chaffey Federal Credit Union, which is based in Upland. The program is offered by the Richard Myles Johnson (RMJ) Foundation, the state foundation for credit unions in California and Nevada, and it aims to teach young people the basics of finance by having them take a "real world" test drive complete with a job, money, and the freedom to make their own financial decisions.

Via the Bite of Reality app, each senior at the school received a persona complete with occupation, salary, spouse and family, student loan debt, credit card debt, and medical insurance payments. With the app also providing them with a personalized monthly income, each student went "shopping" for items such as housing, transportation, food, clothing, household necessities, and daycare.

Throughout the event, the students dealt with pushy salespeople portrayed by volunteers from Chaffey FCU and Fontana-based Inland Valley Federal Credit Union. And when some overspent, those staffing the "credit union" station provided much-needed assistance.
